Judith Miller Jones (President)

Judy retired from a career in health policy and education at the National Health Policy Forum at George Washington University. For more than 30 years, the Forum was renowned for its off-the-record briefings, publications and site visits to assist congressional staff and high-level executive agency officials gain un-biased and practical information for their decision-making. Locally, Ms. Jones has served of the Board of the Jefferson County Health Department and, with her husband Rev. Stan Jones, helped to start Good Shepherd Interfaith Caregivers, still serving the elderly and disabled after more than 25 years. She remains very active on various boards and is especially involved in health and related activities through her work with Health & Human Services Collaborative in the Eastern Panhandle and the Eastern West Virginia Community Foundation. A member of the Institutional Review Board at Shepherd University (which oversees privacy and the protection of human subjects data), she also serves on the boards of Panhandle Home Health, Inc. and the Shenandoah Valley Medical Center Foundation. At one time, Ms. Jones was an instrumentrated pilot; today she is an amateur artist and an avid gardener. Judy joined the Friends of Music board in 2016 with a love of music and a desire for more students to prosper from a well-rounded education, including exposure to the arts and music.

Heidi Johnston (Vice President)

Living in Ipswich, Massachusetts until 2019, she served for 9 years on the Town's Planning Board, where she chaired monthly meetings, oversaw public hearings, enacted local zoning bylaws, and recommended policy changes.
